Ms Wang Limin HONORED



The hard work and selfless dedication of Ms. Wang Limin, (Vice Dean of OEC) finally paid off on June 16th 2016 when she won the top 10 best Student Councilor, one of the most prestigious awards of Jiangsu province. The 2015 江苏高校辅导员年度人物 is an annual event organized by the Ministry of Education of the province to select the top 10 best Student Councilors known in Chinese as Fu Dao Yuan from amongst all Colleges and Universities in the province for the immediate past academic year.

This year's event which assessed the 2015 academic year witnessed 113 Student Councilors from 113 Colleges and Universities in the province. Candidates submitted a 30,000 Chinese character story about their works and achievements which was evaluated by a panel of judges from the Ministry of Education. Amongst them to move to the next phase of the competition. Here, candidates were asked to do a 5 minute video presentation from which the number was further slashed to 12.



Finally, the top 10 best Student Councilors were shortlisted based on colleagues' assessment, student votes, public opinions and evaluation by the panel of judges. This great feat chalked by our Vice Dean did not only put the entire Jiangsu University on the map. Ms. Wang Limin is committed to continue showing tireless efforts towards academic excellence, thereby creating a conducive environment for foreign students and making life less stressful on campus. 中文

Chinese (Mandarin) is one of the oldest and most spoken language in the world. The rapid economic growth of China has increased the demand for people seeking to learn the Chinese Language and culture. This is reflected by the growing number of international students learning Chinese here on campus.

Jiangsu University offers a semester or year program that immerses the students in a permanent Chinese environment. It equips the students with the standard tools to learn the Mandarin language and Chinese culture as quickly as possible. Students take intensive courses in written and spoken Chinese language as well as listening (Dictation) Chinese. The students are introduced to calligraphy of the characters by using the same tools as the Chinese artists. Students are taught about the Chinese culture but more specifically the city of Zhenjiang.

Learning about historical sites and reading texts that are still around to be viewed allows students to relate better with the learning process. Spoken Chinese is cultivated through active classes where the teachers spark up light conversation to boost students' confidence. Listening Chinese focuses more on developing the ability to imitate sound.

This is achieved through a dynamic classroom environment, which includes the use of videos and documentaries in the learning process. Beyond the classroom, teachers engage students in promote active learning. The curriculum is set up in a way that allows students to be in the company of native speakers and have personal experiences with local people. They regularly go on field trips to exciting places in and around Zhenjiang. These include the Xi Jin ferry, Beigushan and Jinshan Temple ruins. They not only interact with ordinary citizens but taste local cuisine, see historical sites and come into contact with Chinese art and culture. Students are also trained in some forms of traditional practices such as Tai qi and Beijing Opera.

In just a semester or a year, this program offers quite a lot. It is beneficial for those wishing to gain a comprehensive scope of language and culture as well as those hoping for a close-knit environment.

Interact freely with the society. Chinese language students enjoy HSK scholarships and those who successfully complete two semesters or one academic year of Chinese language get a onetime 50% discount offer on tuition fees for any degree program they pursue. Whatever your expectation, this program will surpass it and give plenty of experience, enjoyment and most of all knowledge. Graduates are expected to read, write and speak Chinese up to the level of HSK3 and be fluent in daily conversation.

Ms. Xu Dan

"So there I was, standing in front of unfamiliar faces from places in the world I had never heard of as a child, about to speak to them in a language that my tongue was still learning to use. Sweaty palms and shaky knees were inevitable but the minute I summoned enough courage to begin my first intensive class 2 years ago, all fear and self-doubt dissipated and I knew I had chosen the career best suited to my existence".

Ms Xu Dan was born and raised in Zhenjiang. Right now she teaches Chinese as a foreign language to international students at Jiangsu University. She is very good at learning Chinese language and was attracted to teaching Chinese as a profession but she always thought she would teach middle school and high school because China hadn't really opened up to foreigners yet. After the Beijing Olympics had brought China firmly into the global spotlight, Chinese learning became more popular than ever and her dream was to help people from around the world learn Chinese language and culture. For the past six years, her life has revolved around teaching Chinese as a foreign language. It's a career that she is deeply passionate about and one that has afforded her a chance to teach students in courses ranging from complete beginner to advanced. She enjoys her work very much all the time.

Love is always the most important. Love leads to the path. She majored in Chinese Language and Literature in 2003 at Jiangsu University. She then furthered her studies and attained a master's degree in Higher Education in 2009. During her master's she was selected by Confucius Institute Headquarters to study at Nankai University in where she obtained a qualification certificate as a volunteer for teaching Chinese as a foreign language. She began to work at the Overseas Education College of Jiangsu University from 2010.



She felt tremendously grateful and devoted herself to improving skills. During this time, she gained certification for advanced overseas Chinese teaching from the Confucius Institute Headquarters as well as later the proficiency certificate for teaching Chinese as a second language at China's best language university, Beijing Language and Culture University. She took time to incorporate field trips and interesting cultural content into her lessons, engage her students during class, was open and easy to contact, and constantly sought out feedback to improve her teaching.

She is also trying her best to do some research related works. All her colleagues and students are her most trust source of motivation in her work. She do believe that "Change is not merely necessary to life, it is life." After six years of teaching, she needs a way to change herself more. Actually, all things being equal, she is going to embark on a new challenge in Hong Kong next semester as she begins her doctoral research.

What to know on setting up a

Business

Sooner or later we all will be involved with an organization of any level. It may be a firm, a hospital, an industry or even a school, the beauty of it is that all the above have something in common, that is they are all companies. No matter what major you are pursuing, here are some things every graduate needs to know about setting up a company or business.

Sole proprietorship

A firm set up and financed by an individual or a single family. It can be customized and personalized and easily adapted as the owner's require. It is easy to setup and it keeps the owner in control of the business process and culture. Success depends on owners skill and discipline.

Limited Liability

Company/Partnership

A firm set up by 2 or more people who will give other people the opportunity to invest in the business and own part of it as well in the form of shares. It is most appropriate if you wish to start something that requires a large amount of capital or you have shared the idea with other people. Setup procedures are fairly simple. It requires a large capital from external parties and a clearly oriented business plan. Shareholders are liable for company debts up to their shares. One cannot easily adapt new business processes without the consent of shareholders. Also, liability of the residual debts after shares lies on the founder and you may be bought out or removed from your own company by majority shareholders.

"A business that makes nothing but money is a poor business."

Corporation is a legal person, a legal entity separate from its founders and directors.

Incorporated company will be legally registered by the Registrar of Companies. This is ideal for business with a diverse process, large amount of capital and a vision which supersedes the founder. It can easily expand due to large capital from shareholders/bank funding and continue even in the absence of the founder. However, setup can be complex and costly. Vision may be changed by shareholders

Once you have decided the type of company best suits your vision and purpose, you can begin to take the necessary steps towards establishing it. Generally you would require

- A Business Purpose which may be General or specific
- A Business name that does not mislead consumers
- Names of Initial Directors and Officers
- The Legal address of Company Headquarters
- A Company Logo
- Financing options: Shares, Bank Loan, Family Assets, Personal assets.

Most importantly starting a business isn't about money or profits. It is about imagination, creativity and dedication.

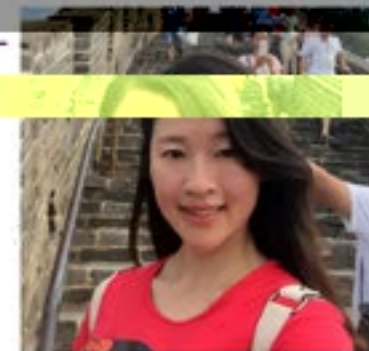

Spotlight Fairness

THE MYTH PERPETUATED BY JSU'S FLAWED SCHOLARSHIP SYSTEM?

In all fairness (pun intended), that title is a little overstated but if the results of undercover conversational surveys I have been carrying out among the international students are anything to go by then it's suggesting the truth.

One student says, "The basic requirements are too stringent, you cannot expect a student to come early every single class without fail, participate in a number of co-curricular activities, finish all his homework and be very sociable while at the same time maintaining impressive grades, not realistic. Again, students who participate in athletics may get more exposure than students who participate in science fairs."

Another student's concerns are different. He explains, "There are too many requirements, even up to now I don't know them all, I think I can aim for excellence scholarship not the others" he adds. Others maintain that, compared to other universities in China, the scholarship grant is little. He explains, "I think they should increase the amount of money given and also increase beneficiaries of the scholarships". And they are not alone; these remarks echo the sentiments of many others. Many students in Jiangsu University do not feel that they have any chance of benefiting from any scholarship whilst others believe that the scholarship assessment criteria are unfair to many students.

However, there are always two sides to every story. "Everyone has a fair chance of being awarded a scholarship. It all depends on how hard you work for one" one student said. She was, however, impassive as to whether with the current system in place she will be able to obtain one.

In every system, no matter how big or small, there are some who feel oppressed and some who feel that the system is run smoothly. But then, there still are cries of injustice. Who presses this, is itself afflicted or truly, there are loopholes but no one bothers to pay attention to? Question to ponder! Irrespective of how perfect or fair we think the systems are, we always have the opportunity of assessing the procedures and possibly "tie the loose ends"

According to every scholarship notice that has been placed, with the exception of the Excellence scholarship, 'Students who love China and Chinese, with good academic achievements, good morality and contribution to OEC and all students, obeying rules of OEC and Overseas Apartment, without any OEC punishments and failed subjects last term' are the only candidates who qualify for selection. From this criterion, I believe comes the so-called injustice. Firstly, company number of students they want, the amount they want.

Secondly, there are some students who maintain a silent profile but still get awarded, it is not difficult to get noticed when your academics and credentials do the speaking for you.

One might say, the relatively 'outspoken' student gets noticed better. Fair enough, it is easier for the vetting panel to recognize the students they have seen running compared to the person behind an article in The Olive magazine. Yet, not everyone who partakes in those sporting events get a scholarship, and there are some, who without being spotted in any sporting discipline manage to get the scholarship. The scholarship awarding system honors students who have had misdeeds. This again is where a lot of students are discontented. 'How can they expect me to be in the apartment on time every time?' one might ask. If there are students who are able to do it by all means, then it is attainable. Before coming to China, to Jiangsu University everyone was required to read the students manual which states the so called 'rigorous' rules. Accepting admission to the school means as a student, you have agreed to comply with all the regulations.

Whether the system is flawed or not, is up to the student to place judgment. **IS JSU'S SCHOLARSHIP SYSTEM FAIR?**

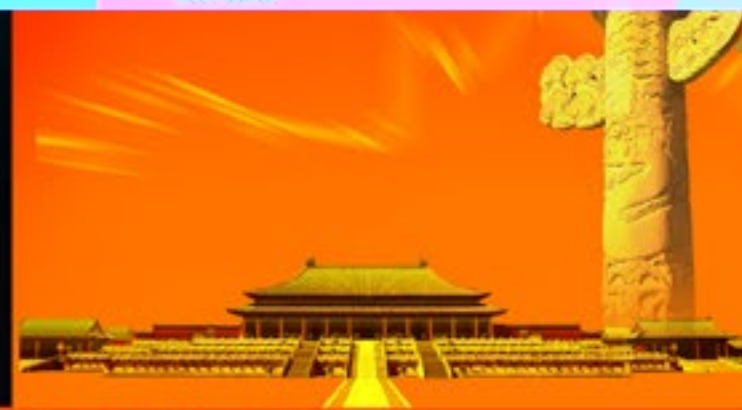

Chinese New Year's Day



My Chinese Cuisine

The culture of a nation resounds in every single aspect of their daily lives. Food is a vivid picture of a people's way of life, history and traditions. One of the reasons some of us come to study in China is to get acquainted with Chinese culture, through food and drink. Nonetheless some of us have been faced with a situation where some of the dishes are very traditional and local that they cannot appeal to us. In this section of My Turn, we would like to give you five basic recipes that you can easily make yourself to suit your personal tastes and preferences.

We have handpicked the most popular dishes of foreigners in China and drilled them to be recreated easily with basic ingredients.

Pork Fried Noodles Zhu rou chao mian 猪肉炒面

Preparation time 15minutes
Ingredients
 4 boneless pork chops (diced)
 3 tablespoons cooking oil
 1/2 cup carrots (in matchstick pieces)

Method
 1. Prepare noodles with salt and cooking oil.
 2. Fry Pork with salt and spices to taste then add carrots, mushrooms, onions and beansprouts (fry well) before adding the eggs



Beef Fried Rice Niurou ji dan chaofan 牛肉鸡蛋炒饭

Preparation time 30 minutes
Ingredients
 1 packet beef (slices)
 1 teaspoon salt
 Spices as desired
 Spring onions (finely chopped)
 Handful frozen peas
 1 egg (beaten)
 1 tablespoon cooking oil
 1 teaspoon soy sauce or to taste

Method
 1. Boil rice. Fry beef strips until well cooked and place in a bowl on the side
 2. Heat oil in a pan/wok, pour beaten egg into wok, stirring constantly. When egg has cooked a little into a scramble (about a minute or two) add frozen peas, spring onions, sliced fried beef strips and stir for a minute.
 3. Next add in the boiled rice into the wok and fry for three minutes.
 4. Add salt and soya sauce to taste and fry for another three minutes. Serve.



2 tablespoons spices
 1/4 cups beansprouts (fresh and chopped)
 1 tablespoon soy sauce
 2 eggs
 Noodles

1. Fry pork with salt and spices to taste then add carrots, mushrooms, onions and beansprouts (fry well) before adding the eggs
 2. Fry the noodles with salt and cooking oil.
 3. Add the fried pork, vegetables and noodles together and stir well.
 4. Add the soy sauce and fry for 2 minutes.
 5. Add the eggs and stir well.
 6. Serve with steamed vegetables.

These recipes are easy to follow yet have that rich Chinese flavor and taste. As you prepare them you will realize the articulacy with which the Chinese prepare food and some tastes they have acquired. Furthermore culture is dynamic, therefore you have the opportunity to develop a personal cuisine culture that is both Chinese and tailored to your personal preferences.

 1 lb boneless skinless chicken breast (diced)

 2 garlic cloves (chopped)

 1/3 cup dry unsalted roasted peanuts

 2. Combine vinegar, soy sauce and sugar in a small bowl and stir well.
 3. Add onions, garlic, red pepper and ginger to pan/wok and stir fry 15 seconds and remove from heat.
 4. Add the combined vinegar, soy sauce and sugar to skillet and stir well. Return chicken to skillet. Stir until chicken is well coated then stir in nuts
 5. Heat thoroughly, stirring occasionally. Then serve with rice.

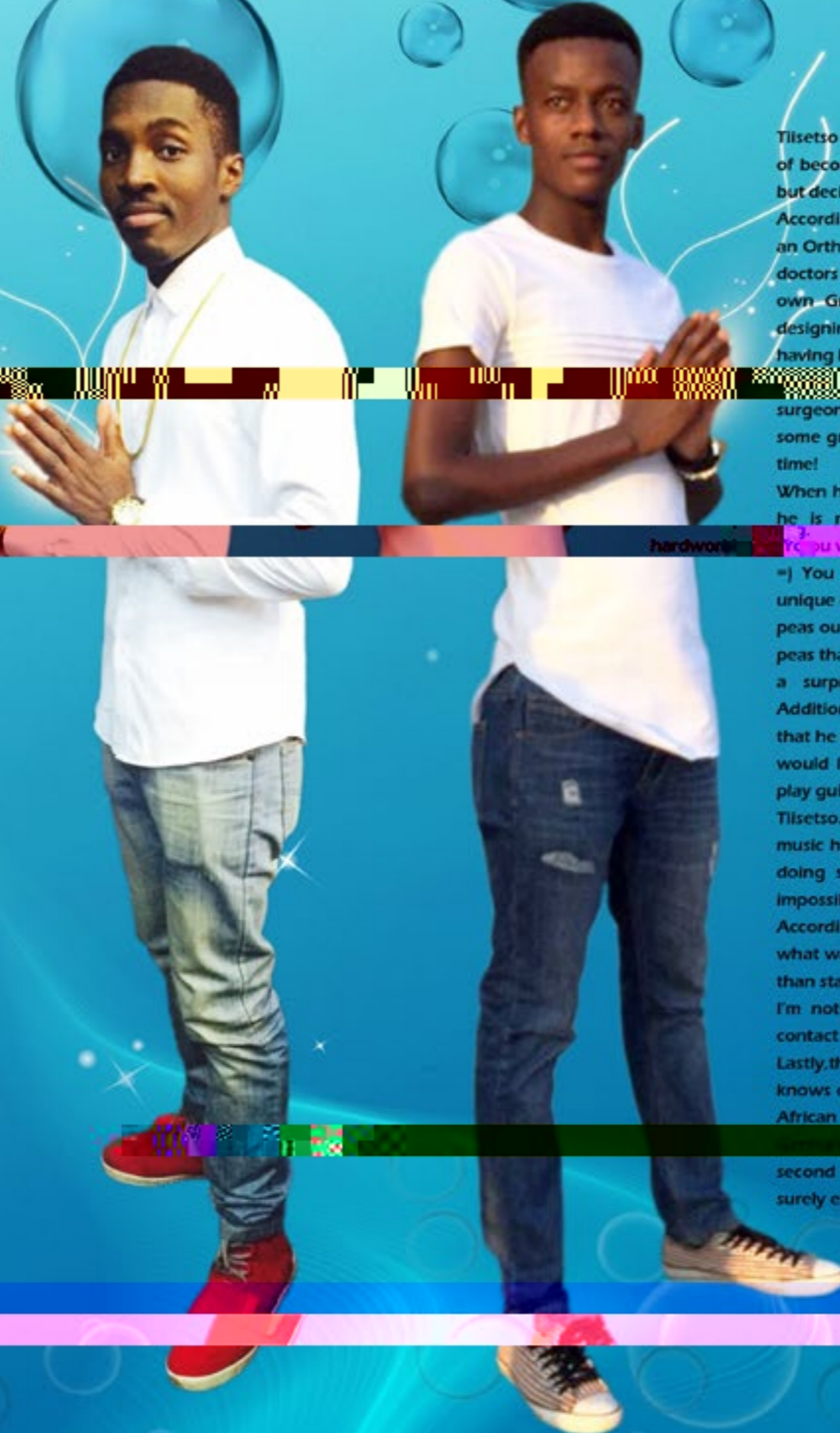
